The Executive Committee of the Louisiana Archaeological Society met Saturday, July 21, 2001 at the University of Louisiana, Lafayette. President Carl Kuttruff called the meeting to order at 11:05 a.m. Members present were:

President Carl Kuttruff welcomed everyone.

MINUTES

After the minutes were read, David Jeane made a motion to accept the minutes as read and as published in the LAS Newsletter, Volume 28, No. 1, Spring 2001. Cherie Schwab seconded the motion which was then passed unanimously.

REPORTS

Treasurer's and Membership Report

David Jeane gave the Treasurer's Report. The balance in the checking account on 6/30/01 was \$5,767.76. The amount of LAS Savings Account "A" was \$7,986.25. LAS Savings Account "B" totaled \$5,401.10. He reported that an increase in expenses was likely due to the increase in publishing costs and the number of Bulletins expected to be published in the near future. He noted that Brian Duhe had completed his payments to the LAS in June 2001. Because of the increase in expenses and reduction in future income, the Executive Committee discussed a change in annual dues. A motion to raise dues for the year 2002 was made by Lucretia McBride and seconded by Cherie Schwab. The motion passed. According to the LAS bylaws, changes in annual dues must be published in the LAS Newsletter thirty days prior to the effective date. To ensure compliance, the changes for all classes of membership beginning January 2002 are to be published in the next newsletter. President Kuttruff thanked Treasurer Jeane for his report.

Discussion was held on the decrease in LAS membership and ways to increase membership. Lucretia McBride said that Delta Chapter was making an extensive effort to not only attract new members, but also to regain old members. In order to attract more student members, Cherie Schwab suggested that a packet be prepared to distribute to new students at the universities. She volunteered to prepare such a packet for new LSU students. Chip McGimsey volunteered to do the same at Lafayette.

ONGOING BUSINESS

Bulletin Report

Bulletin Editor T.R. Kidder was unable to attend the meeting. President Kuttruff and Chip McGimsey informed the Committee that Bulletin No. 25 (1998) would soon be completed. Bulletin No. 26 (1999), Robert Connolly's report on the 1982 Goad Excavations at Poverty Point, is expected to be completed soon after. Material for future bulletins is already being discussed. President Kuttruff expressed the hope that both Bulletin 25 and Bulletin 26 will be published this year. He said that despite continued problems with publication and with the mailing lists, the bulletins hopefully will be caught up soon.

Newsletter Report

Newsletter Editor Cherie Schwab asked for contributions for the next newsletter. She reiterated that there have been serious problems with the mailing list. Cherie and Carl Kuttruff have spent a great deal of time working on these problems and they believe that the list has now been corrected. Cherie commented that a LAS member is needed to maintain the database so that such problems will not occur again. After discussion, the Committee decided that Treasurer Jeane will maintain the database and will send the necessary data to Chip McGimsey who will also keep a copy of the database and oversee printing of mailing labels.

Chapter Reports

Lucretia McBride, President, Delta Chapter reported that Delta Chapter has a strong Board which has instituted a new membership program that promises to be very successful. She reported that their web site is well-frequented. She also remarked that Delta Chapter is prepared to fund and participate in archaeological projects if a request is submitted and approved.

Baton Rouge Chapter has an upcoming field trip that promises to be very interesting. Baton Rouge and all chapters report that speakers are somewhat difficult to secure. People wishing to speak should add their name to the LAS Speakers Bureau.

LAS Web Site

President Kuttruff remarked that the LAS web site has still not been updated. He will ask for volunteers for new webmaster from the Society when the present webmaster's contract expires. Cherie Schwab will place a notice in the next newsletter.

NEW BUSINESS

President Kuttruff reported that the accounting was nearly finished for the last Annual Meeting. He remarked again upon the outstanding job done by the NSU Cultural Resource Office and the NSU Anthropological Society. He gave his thanks to all who worked so hard to make the Meeting such a success.

The 28th Annual Meeting will be held at the Landmark Hotel in Leesville, LA. The price for the rooms will be \$55.75 including taxes. The date has not been decided yet but will probably be either the last weekend of January or the first weekend of February 2002 [*now set for February 1-3. See announcement in Newsletter*]. Ellen Ibert, Curation Collection Specialist at Fort Polk has graciously agreed to organize the meeting. She will be assisted by Mary Cleveland, Director, Museum of West Louisiana.

The Division of Archaeology has asked the LAS for their continued support of Louisiana Archaeology Week. The motion was made by Chip McGimsey to again donate \$200.00 to the Division of Archaeology for Louisiana Archaeology Week. The motion was seconded by Carl Kuttruff and was passed unanimously. The Division will again send out LAS brochures for Archaeology Week.

President Kuttruff was pleased to announce that funds for the Greater New Orleans Archaeologist position were approved at the last Louisiana Legislative Session.

There being no further business, Chip McGimsey made a motion to adjourn. David Jeane seconded

the motion. Motion passed unanimously and President Kuttruff adjourned the meeting at 12:35 p.m.


EAST TEXAS ARCHAEOLOGICAL CONFERENCE

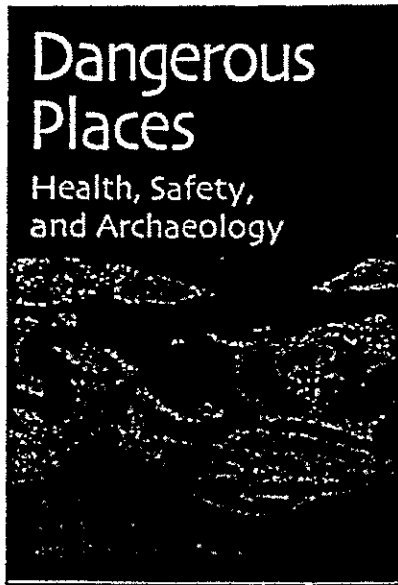

Archaeological sites often seem to be idyllic, even romantic, places where scientists recover and analyze fascinating data that can inform us of past times and the past lives of our recent historical and ancient prehistoric human forebears. Too often, however, unrecognized dangers lie within: bacterial and viral infections hidden in the soil, concealed in the animals that roam through our sites, or even lying in wait in organic remains we excavate; toxic substances produced by the historical technologies we study and that continue to poison the sites where people once worked; the bodies of people who died of historical scourges that once afflicted humanity and whose excavated mortal remains may still harbor the pathogens that killed them, dormant and lying in wait for an unsuspecting and largely no-longer immune modern population. It's enough to make an archaeologist swear off fieldwork!

The truth is, however, that archaeologists need to be alerted to the dangers present in fieldwork and advised of the reasonable precautions that should be taken to insure the safest possible working environment. *Dangerous*

Places brings together an enormous body of information regarding the threats that archaeologists face every day, and the best ways of behaving proactively to avoid or mitigate these threats.
